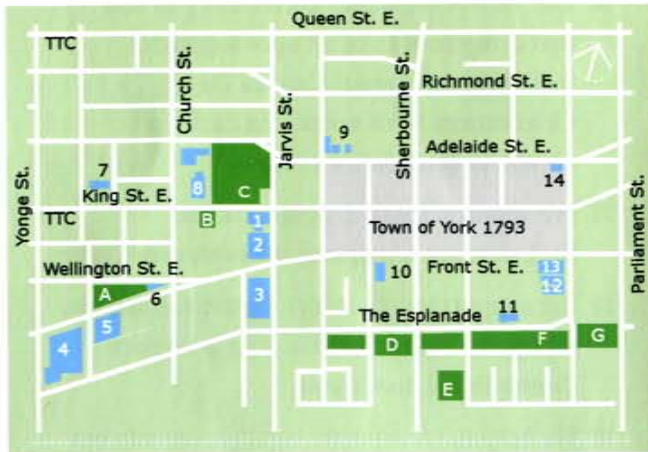


## St. Lawrence Area Map

## What is the St. Lawrence Neighbourhood Association?

Since 1982, the St. Lawrence Neighbourhood Association (SLNA) has been a vital part of this downtown community. The SLNA has been an advocate for responsible development and has promoted public and pedestrian safety, organized events, and championed the neighbourhood's interests with all levels of government. It has brought together the 25,000 residents in the area bounded by Yonge Street on the west, Queen Street on the north, Parliament Street on the east and the railway tracks on the south.

Members of our community who live or work in the St. Lawrence Neighbourhood are encouraged to attend SLNA meetings and participate in the activities of the Association as volunteers. Delegates from member housing groups (cooperatives, condominiums, freehold townhouses, Toronto Community Housing Corporation buildings) are eligible to vote at SLNA meetings and to serve on the SLNA Executive. Neighbourhood organizations are invited to join the SLNA as Associate (non-voting) Members.



## What does the SLNA do?

### Enhances the quality of life

- Together, we are working with neighbourhood residents, businesses and community organizations to foster a greener environment, a healthier, more engaged community and a stronger local economy.

### Advocates for good development

- The SLNA works with City planners and developers to ensure that new development will be compatible with the heritage character of the neighbourhood, while incorporating the latest “green” technology.
- We encourage the beautification of our parks and other public spaces.
- We promote public transit and bicycle lanes.

### Represents the neighbourhood at all levels of government

- We encourage the attendance of our elected representatives at SLNA delegates' meetings in order to secure direct access to our politicians in a publicly accountable forum.
- We maintain ongoing dialogue with the three levels of government to ensure our community's interests are represented.

### Encourages a sense of community

- The SLNA organizes community events that bring people of all ages together, including the annual Canada Day Celebration. Visit [www.slna.ca](http://www.slna.ca) for a complete calendar of events.
- We sponsor Youth Programs at the St. Lawrence Community Recreation Centre.
- We support local seniors' initiatives and are taking the lead in establishing a Seniors Centre in the community.
- We help to incorporate newcomers into our community.
- The SLNA has representation on various area boards, committees and associations. This includes: 51 Division Community Police Liaison Committee (CPLC), the Old Town Toronto Network (OTTN), St. Lawrence Community Recreation Centre Advisory Council

### Promotes a safe community

- We work to promote safety through activities such as lobbying for improved lighting throughout the neighbourhood and championing additional pedestrian safety measures.
- We also organize community safety walks involving residents, local security personnel, police and City staff.
