2. OPENING OF MEETING

2.1 Opening Remarks

Suzanne Kavanagh (President) stated that she would be chairing the meeting. She called the session to order at 7:00 P.M.

S. Kavanagh noted that the Development Committee report and the Busker Fest topic would be deferred until the next meeting as both M. Little and B. Taylor were not able to attend the meeting.

2.3 Approval of Minutes

The delegates reviewed the minutes of the meeting held on April 29, 2009.

3. TORONTO WATERFRONT MARATHON (Dennis Glasgow)

D. Glasgow introduced himself as well as A. Brookes (Director of the Toronto Waterfront Marathon), and marathon participants Darek Kocan and Chung-yee Loo He stated that the event was scheduled to take place on September 27th and there would be a number of runners from the SLNA neighbourhood participating in both the half and full marathons.

The path has been altered to make it a more urban run through the Beach, Eastern Avenue and St. Lawrence. A cheering section is being organized to support local runners and will be located at Berczy Park. ScotiaBank waterfront branch will also support the event.

A. Brookes stated that the run is an international class event and it will have a huge economic impact on the city which is estimated at \$20,000,000. Last year's event drew over 15,000 participants and 18,000 are expected from around the world in 2009. More information can be obtained via its website at <u>www.torontowaterfrontmarathon.com</u>.

It is also a community/neighbourhood event which has helped raise \$1,420,000 for approximately sixty-four local charities who leverage the festivities for their fund-raising. Seventy-eight charities have already signed up and there are also 2,000 volunteers to assist.

Q. A delegate questioned whether a mentoring program was available for young runners. A. A. Brookes stated that the 'Marathon Kids' program was established and nineteen schools participated in the previous year. The children run daily after Labour Day and record their achievements on a progress sheet. They target thirty-seven kilometres by the end of September and then participate in a 5km run with a number of other schools. They are also given t-shirts and medals are awarded.

A. Brookes stated that he would make large and small posters available through D. Glasgow. These promote participation and also invite spectators to cheer on the runners.

The medals for 2009 will also feature the St. Lawrence Market building.

Q. D. O'Leary asked the age of the oldest and youngest runners in last year's event.

A. A. Brookes stated that participants are required to be at least 18 years of age to participate in the full marathon and 16 years of age to run in the half marathon. Small children may run in the 5km run. In 2003, one runner became the first man to complete the run in under three hours. This represents 7-minute miles! On the same day, a 92 year-old runner from London completed the run in 5 hours and 40 minutes and this remains a world record.

A. Brookes noted that many participants with disabilities also take part in the 5km category but joggers with baby-joggers or wheelchairs are not yet permitted.

S. Kavanagh stated that she would enter the half marathon. Either way she will sponsor Dennis, Derek, and Chung-Yee \$50 each towards a registered charity of their choice. She also called for a volunteer to chair a Cheering Committee for the SLNA neighbourhood Challenge. Anyone interested should advise the Executive Committee.

4. CANADA DAY (Connie Yang)

C. Yang introduced herself as the Canada Day event chair. She stated that the event is organized for all citizens so she encouraged all to join in the festivities.

C. Yang reported that she received a letter from the Toronto Parks and Recreation Department advising that \$6,909.87 had been set aside for appeals for funding to the City. They were recommending an allocation of \$4,590 for the SLNA pending approval of two motions – a resolution to comply with the City's policy statement against discrimination and a resolution to submit the grant application.

On behalf of and with the authority of the SLNA, it was resolved to declare that the SLNA adopts and upholds the City of Toronto's policy statement which prohibits discrimination and harassment and protects the right to be free of that activity, based on age, ancestry, citizenship, creed (religion), colour, disability, ethnic origin, family status, gender identity, level of literacy, marital status, place of origin, membership in a union or staff association, political affiliation, race, receipt of public assistance, record of offences, sex, sexual orientation or any other personal characteristics by or within the organization. All were in favour and the **motion was CARRIED**.

C. Yang thanked B. Leps for his assistance with the administrative paperwork as well as B. Kemp for coordinating the barbeque. She also thanked Councillor McConnell for her support of the event.

C. Yang noted that the Seniors Group planning board includes J. Williams as Chair and M. Comstock as Treasurer. Approximately fifty more volunteers are being sought for the committee. A meeting is set for May 28th between 4-6pm at OWN coop, 115 The Esplanade, and 25-30 individuals have already indicated interest. Additional volunteers can contact C. Yang directly at 416-368-2417. She noted that George Smitherman will also attend and provide refreshments. Volunteers are also required for the day of the event.

S. Kavanagh suggested that research be undertaken to identify a Guinness Book of Records achievement that could be broken at the event.

7. COMMUNITY POLICING UPDATE (Suzanne Kavanagh)

S. Kavanagh stated that Keith Bricknell had been the SLNA representative to the CPLC. He has retired so the Executive is seeking a volunteer to replace him. The individual would be expected to provide regular reports back to the SLNA and play an advisory role to ensure the community's ideas and concerns are communicated.

D. O'Leary nominated L. Wolde-Gabriel who accepted the role. L. Allen volunteered to be his alternate. L. Wolde-Gabriel was acclaimed to the position.

Announcements from Pam McConnell's Office – Tom Davidson

T. Davidson stated that a past president of the SLNA contacted Pam McConnell's office to request more regular hazardous waste pick-up for multi-resident buildings. The City has now announced a pilot program and the SLNA was selected to participate.

Hazardous and electrical waste pick-up will take place on June 13th between 1-3pm followed by August 29th and November 7th. Two vehicles will be stationed at OWN and New Hibret. Information sheets and a map will be made available so they can be posted to the SLNA website and emailed to all the buildings.

A neighbourhood walkabout will also be organized by Pam McConnell's office to review development activity in the area. Participants will include AI Rezoski, Acting Planning Manager and Pam McConnell. This will be an opportunity for residents to learn the history and general context of various projects and ask questions they may have. The walk will take place on June 22nd at 6pm and will start at the Market Kitchen in the South Market (meeting at 5:30 p.m.). It will last for approximately 2 hours. The itinerary will be posted to the SLNA website.

A planning public meeting, regarding 5-7 The Esplanade, is scheduled for Monday June 1st at 7pm in the St. James Cathedral. The proposed development includes above ground parking as well as residential space above this.

Sign-up Sheet and Notices

D. O'Leary encouraged the delegates to take various brochures, such as the Community Garage Sale pamphlet, and post these in their buildings.

He stated that volunteers are also being sought for the Vegetables-In-The-Sky project planned for Saturday July 27th. Tickets for the event will cost \$20 and will be available at Starbucks and

Second Cup. It will be self-directed tour of seven rooftops and the money raised will go toward the Children's Garden program. The tour hours are 10-2 p.m.

Community Garden

C. Limberti stated that a Community Garden Group was recently created to take-up the cause of maintaining the previously neglected common area behind the OWN Co-op. The City has supplied the soil/plants and the Toronto Housing has provided funds as well. They will also facilitate a community workshop on June 8th with the SLNA to discuss the vision for the area.

Adopt-A-Block

R. Yaron encouraged more participation in the Adopt-a-Block program. Approximately eight individuals have volunteered thus far with good results. A list of unclaimed areas will be posted to the SLNA website. Volunteers may report various items requiring attention to the City such as waste on the side-walks and required repairs.

Retaining Wall - Lakeshore

S. Kavanagh reported that a retaining was built on Lakeshore by the railway lands. Al Rezoski has indicated that an event could be planned for planting to cover up the retaining wall.

GO Transit Update

M. Raizenne stated that a survey was sent to ninety-eight local residents regarding the north side of railway embankment. Fifty responses were received with majority supporting the removal of most of the existing vegetation/trees, cleaning up the embankment and fixing the curb, and installing a short one-metre retaining wall. A new planting of trees and shrubbery would then follow.

Work is expected to begin in August or September and be completed by the end of the year.
