An SLNA Update:

Redeveloping the St. Lawrence Farmers Market

In January 1999, the City of Toronto's Corporate Services Department asked the SLNA to consider the redevelopment of the North Market with a view to addressing a number of concerns: underutilization and underperformance, building safety and maintenance, parking and loading, and lack of Heritage character and use. Six months later, a subcommittee of the SLNA, the St. Lawrence Community & Farmers North Market Redevelopment Initiative (NMI), began to look at ways to replace the existing structure with a multipurpose market building that is selfsustaining and compatible with the Heritage buildings around it.

City staff provided support and direction to the SLNA, but at the same time

local residents and to condominium, neighbourhood and business associations kept the community informed and provided feedback at every step of the way.

In November 2000, with financial support from the South East Downtown Economic Redevelopment Initiative (SEDERI), the NMI commissioned a feasibility study and a design concept report. In November 2001, Spears and Associates Inc. completed the feasibility study and in April 2002 B + H Architects presented their Concept Design Report. Currently, both of these reports are being discussed with community representatives, including the North Market Farmers Association.

Achievements of the Year: Great things the SLNA did in 2002

Building community The SLNA's annual June Picnic/Festival was attended by over 5,000 people. Undeterred by the rain, neighbours of all ages joined in the fun and \$6,200 was raised for SLNA projects.

Raised \$18,800 for SLNA & community youth projects, with \$13,800 coming from the March 2002 Gala, and \$5,000 from the Film Industry, facilitated by Councillor Pam McConnell. These projects include an aquatics leadership program, a nutrition program and summer programming.

Working with others SLNA representatives actively supported the South East Downtown Economic Redevelopment Initiative (SEDERI), the Citizens for the Old Town, the North Farmers' Market Redevelopment Initiative, the

St. Lawrence Community Recreation Centre (CRC) and Circles of Support. The SLNA also cooperated with neighbouring residents' associations on issues of mutual concern.

Improving area parks Due to SLNA efforts, \$119,000 was allocated by the City Parks Department to enhance safety in Crombie, Market Lane and St. James parks.

Increasing security Liaison with the police in 51 and 52 Division resulted in a more accountable police force, an increased security presence and a decreased crime rate in our neighbourhood.

Ensured that our political representatives listen to the community: The SLNA takes an active role in liaising with and seeking the constructive support Councillor Pam McConnell, MPP George Smitherman, and MP Bill Graham to address community issues. Each level of government is represented at SLNA meetings.

Raising awareness and influencing the future of our city The SLNA addressed many current planning issues important to residents of the St. Lawrence Neighbourhood. These included schemes for expanding the Toronto Island Airport, revitalizing the Waterfront, dealing with the Gardiner Expressway, upgrading the Hummingbird Centre, renovating Union Station, reforming Healthcare and securing the future of the First Parliament site.



pronged phase of its campaign. First, the staff in Corporate Services will study the proposal and give its opinion. Secondly, the NMI will mount a fundraising campaign to raise around \$500,000 over the next three years.

By obtaining matching grants from various agencies, it should be possible to reduce the principle sufficiently to permit the building of a North Market that will both conform to the zoning guidelines and maintain an appropriate scale relative to its neighbours.
