The SLNA Festival has always been a memorable event for our community. Twenty-three years ago, it started out as a small community picnic that drew fewer than 100 people. Last year, more than 5,000 attended. As we grew, so did the sponsorships and donations from local businesses. In the beginning, most of the support came from area building developers and the St. Lawrence Market. Recent SLNA accomplishments

—Temporary 504 King bus

The SLNA played a major role in persuading the TTC to provide a bus replacement service from Queen and Broadview to Union Station, via Eastern Avenue and Front Street during track construction work on King Street. You are urged to use this 15-minute service, which will run until July 6.

—Park improvements

Last year, a Safety Audit of Crombie Park, St. James Park and Market Lane Park led to the allocation of \$119,000 for much-needed repairs and safety-related improvements to these neighbourhood parks. Look out for the results in the coming weeks and months!

I still remember the SLNA's positive response when I presented the Circles of Support initiative to the delegates two years ago. Since then, the two SLNA representatives who joined our project committee have helped us tremendously as we moved from the stage of conception to concrete action. For those unfamiliar with our work, here is a brief recap of the programs already in place, about to be launched and under active consideration.

Circles of Support grew out of a belief that healthy families build healthy communities and that strengthening the

an outstanding success. The 300 guests enjoyed a wonderful evening in the historic St. Lawrence Hall while raising over \$9,000 for youth programs.

The evening featured entertainment by singer Karen Manion and pianist Dennis Keldie, the swing music of Tory Cassis and the Saturday Night Function, history presentations by Bruce Bell, a midevening buffet by Biagio Ristorante and an extensive silent auction featuring over \$10,000 worth of items. If you weren't there you missed a great evening with excellent value! With the generous support of sponsors and SLNA volunteers, tickets for the special fundraiser were only \$20.

A key part of the event was the annual SLNA Volunteer Awards Ceremony to honour people who have donated their time to make our neighbourhood a better place to live, work and raise a family. The SLNA gave Volunteer Recognition Awards to Dorothy Creaser, Marcia Douglas, Lawrence Hawke and Ian Waldron. Special Recognition

Awards went to Susan Bellan, Hugh-Francis Burns, Chuck Cameron and Michael Comstock, while the new Award of Merit for making an exemplary contribution to both the SLNA and the broader community was presented to Alan Seymour. The Volunteer of the Year Award went to Mel Shipman (see Circles of Support, below).

The SLNA has a long-standing commitment to youth, based on needs-analysis, public forums and direct consultation with young people in the community. To date we have raised \$23,000 in Gala proceeds to support youth projects. This year's Gala proceeds will fund Phases 2 & 3 of the SLNA Youth Aquatics Leadership Training Program. Begun last vear in partnership with the St. Lawrence Community Recreation Centre (SLCRC), this program trains young people—at no cost— to become fully qualified lifeguards who will find employment with the City of Toronto. Gala money will also finance the SLCRC's new Summer Leadership Program and an SLCRC-run out-of-town Summer Camping Program that focuses on training for leadership; and it will contribute to local school-based nutrition programs and summer sports activities.

capacity of parents and children to cope with life's challenges will reinforce St. Lawrence's reputation as a model area in which to live and work. To realize this vision, we have begun a series of parenting and life-skills classes at Market Lane Public School, run by staff of the Family Service Association of Toronto, and English-as-a-Second-Language classes for new immigrants at the St. Lawrence Community Recreation Centre (SLCRC) that are led by two wonderful community volunteers. We are also working with Parent Resources to set up an Early Years/Family Resource Centre at 222 The Esplanade. If all goes well, we should be operational early next year. Meanwhile, over the summer months, Parent Resources will be launching a number of new programs in our neighbourhood.

About six months ago, Circles of Support brought together representatives from the co-ops and rental buildings in the vicinity to look at what could be done to adapt the empty City-owned retail space along the south side of The Esplanade (between Market and Church) to community use. One of the ideas that quickly surfaced was to establish a Seniors' Centre as a satellite division of the SLCRC at 115 The Esplanade. Our municipal councillor, Pam McConnell, was very supportive but alerted us to the fact that the City intends to house administrative services in the entire 15,000 square feet of available space. At present the parties concerned are meeting to discuss a possible compromise that will make the Seniors' Centre a reality.
