Global Refugee Crisis: Facts You Need to Know

UNHCR 2018 Report, Global Trends 2018:

- **NUMBER OF PEOPLE:** Number of people fleeing war, persecution and conflict exceeded 70 million in 2018, the highest level since the Second World War
- **CHILDREN**: In 2018, every second refugee was a child, many (111,000) alone and without their families.
- **TODDLERS**: Uganda reported 2,800 refugee children aged five or below alone or separated from their families.
- **DURATION:** Nearly 4 in every 5 refugees are in displacement situations that have lasted for at least five years. One in 5 have been in displacement situations that have lasted 20 years or more.
- **COUNTRIES**: Syria, Afghanistan, South Sudan, Myanmar continue to account for the largest groups of refugees. As well, there is a new major humanitarian crisis in Venezuela over 4 million Venezuelans have left the country since 2015, including scores of pregnant women and mothers with small children.

Canada's Role: Resettled More Refugees in 2018 than any Other Country

- Resettlement remains an important life-saving tool to ensure the protection of refugees.
- UNHCR's report also shows that in 2018, Canada took in more refugees than any other country (28,100) overtaking the U.S. for the first time since the 1980 Refugee Act.
- Most were survivors of violence and torture, or refugees whose life, liberty, safety or other fundamental rights were at risk.
- Many were vulnerable women and girls.
- Two thirds of the resettled refugees coming to Canada were privately sponsored by Canadian citizens.

About the St. James Cathedral Refugee Response Committee

- In November 2015, a group of community members and St. James Cathedral parishioners gathered to respond to the Syrian refugee crisis. It has been a fruitful alliance!
- Through Canada's unique blended visa program, we support these newcomers financially, practically, socially, and emotionally during their first year of resettlement.
- The Committee is accountable to St. James Cathedral and its sponsorship agreement holder, the Anglican United Refugee Alliance (AURA).
- Currently have 17 active committee members.

St. James Cathedral Refugee Response Committee's Past Sponsorships

Three (3) separate sponsorships have been undertaken and completed:

- 1. A single male from Iran facing persecution due to sexual orientation.
 - Successes: reunited with daughter, attending ESL classes, secured permanent housing
- 2. A family of five from Syria came following a successful fundraising campaign and generous support of over \$125,000 donated
 - Successes: securing permanent housing, mom works full-time sewing and tailoring, dad works full time in a skilled trade, all kids (ages 5, 10 and 12) are in school
- 3. A minor from Iran whose sponsorship was somewhat different as she was the teen-aged daughter of the first individual we sponsored. Having been separated from her father for 6 years, this sponsorship came with its challenges but happy to say she is doing well.
 - Successes: reunited with father, registered full-time in school, registered in extracurricular activities

They all continue to embrace their new life in Canada.

St. James Cathedral Refugee Response Committee's Future Sponsorship

- Thanks to the generous donations of the community our fundraising campaign has raised enough now for the 4th sponsorship!
- Women and girls make up around 50% of any refugee, internally displaced or stateless population and are least likely to be sponsored.
- Based on the potential for significant impact and our now 4 years of experience, we created a profile that was different: single mother with child(ren).
- Details of our upcoming sponsorship:
 - Single mother with 3 year old child from Cameroon facing persecution
 - Arrival date: expected in 4-8 weeks
 - · Challenges: affordable, sustainable housing and emotional support
