



By Isorine Marc - Jamii's Founder, Executive & Programming Director **Reflecting on 2019**

Reflecting on 2019 is inspiring: it has been a beautiful year for Jamii; one of growth, enriching partnerships, exciting projects in our community, and throughout the Province. A year during which one of our dreams came true: the creation of a mobile theatre for our community, the Kisanii Hub. Last but not least, in 2019, Jamii refined its goal of both building community through multiple artistic initiatives, and nurturing young women in leadership.

In 2019, we continued collaborating with our key community partners: the St Lawrence Neighbourhood Association, the Toronto Public Library (St Lawrence Branch), the St Lawrence Market BIA, and our local schools: Market Lane P.S., Downtown Alternative School, and St Michael's Catholic School. We also developed partnerships with artistic institutions local to The Esplanade: Soulpepper Theatre Company; Canadian Stage; Meridian Hall; Young People's Theatre; Théâtre Français de Toronto; and Canadian Opera Company. We met regularly throughout the year and organized together, in Crombie Park, projects such as "Discover Dance", a community choir and Indigenous Day celebration. These partnerships will continue flourishing in 2020 with the common goal of igniting more artistic experiences for all Esplanadians.

Jamii increased the number of projects and events in Crombie Park, especially through programming with the Kisanii Hub; and by creating an outdoor stage for our community. With "The Stories The Wind Carries", we shared our expertise of community engagement through the arts with other communities - Wolfe Island, Wawa, Michipicoten First Nation and Pikangikum First Nation – sharing our multiple stories through the process. It is yet another project that will continue expanding in 2020. Taking Jamii beyond the borders of the Esplanade, as far as 1000kms away, is a big deal and we are extremely proud.

Jamii's commitment to young women in our community is not new. However, in 2019, we took it a step further by asking 20 young women how Jamii had impacted their lives and the community. We acted on their feedback to develop a Women in Leadership initiative named LAINI, which will be launched in 2020. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the dedicated women who have made a huge impact to Jamii in 2019, including Mio Miyake Muyoboke and Yusra Yacout (Summer Project Coordinators), Angel Narick and Zarita Adhiambo (Community Outreach and Project Coordinators), Kerryn Graham (Ambassador to Wolfe Island), Sharon McMillan our new co-President (along with Jim Adams), and a special dedication to Georgia Reynolds our past President, who has been on Jamii's Board of Directors since its very first year in 2011.

Jamii continues to bring a lot of personal growth for me. I am grateful to have such a meaningful job in which I can pour all my passion. A job that I feel makes a difference in people's lives and impacts positively on our community. I am looking forward to both celebrating Jamii's 10th Season with all of you, and seeing the organization continue to thrive in our blooming and dynamic community.

Jamii's new outdoor mobile theatre and social hub The Kisanii Hub

"Kisanii" in Swahili means "artistic".

The Kisanii Hub is a cargo bike, customized into a multi-use outdoor arts space: it is at once a mobile presenting venue, a creative lab that engages with locals, and a community hub in the park. It also transforms into a performance stage, a cinema, a puppet stage, an exhibition space and a dance floor to name but a few. This mobile arts space has the flexibility to host a wide range of artistic propositions throughout our community - engaging diverse audiences of all ages.

The Kisanii Hub is a project that was developed throughout 2019, thanks to the support of Laneway Project, Charlie Freewheels, Canadian Heritage, Canada Council for the Arts, Ontario Arts Council, St Lawrence Neighbourhood Association and St Lawrence Market BIA.

Mark your calendars for the Kisanii Hub's official launch in the Spring 2020.

Jamii's Women in Leadership Initiative **LAINI**

"Laini" is a Swahili word that means to flatten an area with the intent of making it accessible. It is a very similar meaning to "esplanade", which is a flattened path for people to walk on. LAINI is about giving every woman the confidence and tools to see themselves as leaders; it is about equal chances, and the ability for all to walk the path of leadership. For years, Jamii has been engaging young women in its programming through volunteering opportunities, participating in creative workshops, and working within the organization. However, we have never had an official Women in Leadership programme. Between July and September 2019, Jamii invited 20 young women (Jamii's past participants) to take part in a one-on-one discussion to assess Jamii's impact on their lives and on their community. A full report is being prepared by Tanjin Ashraf and will be available in January 2020. Here is a series of testimonials that speak to the work we have already done. All are excerpts from the one-on-one series of 20 interviews.

"I gained confidence with my abilities; it was the first time singing in front of a crowd."

"Jamii has enabled my connection with community which wasn't there before."
"Jamii has potential for creating social capital and link for people to access public information like town hall meetings, which I got to be part of."

"When you transition to high school, there is no time to do things you like doing so Jamii created a space for that, and to think critically about my own creativity." "Jamii brings out the need to preserve community values. This has given me motivation to advocate for community in relation to social housing."

Based on our initial findings, we set the following goals for LAINI: 1) Nurturing leadership skills; 2) Discovering one's artistic path/finding one's voice; 3) Igniting self-drive; 4) Connecting girls to matching mentors. LAINI is being launched in January 2020.

I am me (Girl, I got you).

June 19-21, 2019

Indigenous Week

Inviting the Esplanade community to celebrate the Indigenous Way.

A week of engagement between indigenous artists and 300 locals in the Esplanade community. Artists involved: Brian Outinen (Wawa/Michipicoten First Nation), Terri-Lynn Brennan (Wolfe Island), Mahlikah Awe:ri, Kim Weathley, Rhonda Doxtator, and Lindy Kinoshameg.

During the week, Jamii organized workshops in both Market Lane Public School and Downtown Alternative School; a talk at the St Lawrence Library moderated by Kim Wheatley, with performances by Mahlikah Awe:ri; two talks for seniors taking place in both Crombie park and the St Lawrence Community Recreation Centre in partnership with the SLNA; a talk in the park with youth from the St Lawrence daycare; and one afternoon of celebration in partnership with Young People's Theatre featuring IndigenizUS workshop by Lindy Kinoshameg, hoop dance performance by Rhonda Doxtator and a spoken word workshop with Mahlikah Awe:ri. With support from Canadian Heritage.














I am me. I am home.

The reflective nature of this workshop invited each of the women to a space of vulnerability in order to embrace inner beauty. The workshop encouraged them to see, share and celebrate who they are. The participants explored both empathy and their natural qualities in a safe and creative space. A total of 10 young women took part in this series of 4 workshops.









October 5, 2019

Toronto Nuit Blanche lam me. lam heart.

While the city celebrated the annual Toronto Nuit Blanche event, Jamii invited audiences to participate in a sensory experience inspired by our award-winning documentary "At Heart".

25 Esplanadians took the audience on a unique and interactive journey through David Crombie Park in our own version of Nuit Blanche. The show offered a site-specific interactive experience to audiences who were then invited for a viewing of "At Heart" at the end of each performance. Audience: 100+




The Stories The Wind Carries

Wawa & Michipicoten First Nation

"The Stories The Wind Carries" invited residents of each community to create "portraits" of fellow community members. The creation of these portraits started with a one-on-one conversation and materialized through photography, visual arts and creative writing.

In November 2019, the Jamii team (composed of Isorine Marc, Darren Marshall, Georgia Reynolds, artist Kara Spencer and artist Dan Bergeron) traveled to Wawa to create the first 22 portraits of the project. The project was enthusiastically received by the community ending in a celebration on November 16th at the Lakeview Hotel with 60 people in attendance, sharing their portraits and experience through the project.







December 2019

The Stories The Wind Carries **Pikangikum First Nation**

Artist Mahlikah Awee:ri and Director Isorine Marc traveled to Pikangikum First Nation to plan the first phase of the project that will take place in February 2020. They met with Principals Marvin McKay-Keenan and Walter Latt of the Eenchokay Birchstick School, as well as Arts Teacher Vanessa Hazel, Project Journey Narcisse Kakegabon, Artist Darwin Peters, Teacher and Artist Lucie Strang, and many others.
